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How an Individual's Perspective of, and Response to, a Crisis define him or her?

The short story 'The Rabbits' written by Shaun Tan and John Marsden is one of the stories that talks about the conducts and mannerisms of individuals. Tan narrates a story which acts as the basis of how an individual can cope with a crisis; he relates with the reader as he explains how is threatened not be paid if he does not prolong the story. The short story highlights the manner in which an individual reacts and responds to a conflict, enabling us to observe and experience their personality. This helps us to identify them as normal individuals and to experience their different approaches to life and their diverse set of thinking.

Tan introduces the audience to the aboriginals and the rabbits who have different ways of living indicating that they were able to make their different choices in their lifestyles. While the aboriginals lived in the trees, the rabbits cut them down to make their homes. This shows they were different animals with different cultures.

The aboriginals' elders had warned them that the rabbits would come and take away their lands and make them their homes. They were peaceful people, but they were losing their lands, their children, their homes, and women to the rabbits. They were faced with a choice to fight for what belonged to them.
