Purposes:

These assignments should: 1) indicate your comprehension of course readings and concepts; 2) encourage original thinking and critical interpretation; and 3) draw connections between our texts and worldly matters relevant to our authors and ourselves.

I allow some flexibility with these Reading Analysis assignments and I encourage you to experiment with your interpretations, test out thesis statements, and examine what *you* are interested in.

Requirements:

These write-ups are short—about 2-pages long (double-spaced). FIRST, briefly **summarize** the reading (your summary should be less than one page); SECOND, **explain** a major theme that the work addresses that connects with our primary course concepts; THIRD **analyze** the effects of one or two of its **premier formal properties**—decisions that the author has made, like an interesting use of simile, setting, symbolism, irony, etc. (ask yourself why this formal property is significant, or how it influences a reader's interpretation of the work or theme).

Each Reading Analysis **must** cover the work that will be addressed on the day that the assignment is due.

Particulars:

- Minimum 2 complete pages; double-spaced; 1-inch margins all around; 12-point Times New Roman font.
- Do *not* add a cover page.
- Include a title, centered, that clearly indicates your *topic* (not just the name of the assignment).
- Include your name, my name, the course number, and the date in the upper left corner.
- Use quotations and/or paraphrases from our readings, analyze those quotations, and cite correctly in MLA form.
- Use MLA citation rules for in-text citations. Include a Works Cited page.
- Use conventional punctuation throughout:

Grading:

You will be graded on your <u>understanding</u> of the readings, the <u>clarity</u> of your prose, the <u>organization</u> of your response, the <u>correctness</u> of your comparisons, and your inclusion of <u>formal analysis</u>.

Review:

Your writing should reflect clear and organized thoughts. I do not separate your ideas from their presentation, so don't let good thoughts be dulled by sloppy writing.
