

In the future, you always need to include a Works Cited list at the bottom of your essay. This Works Cited list presents all of your sources in MLA format, which follows this style:

Author's Last Name, First Name if given. "Title of Article in Quotation Marks." *Title of Website in Italics*. URL (without https://). Day Month Year of Access.

Here is an example of a Works Cited entry:

You will often encounter websites that do not list the author's name. If this is the case then you can simply omit the author's name and start by listing the title of the article.

You also need to include in-text citations whenever you use information from any of your sources. An in-text citation follows this style:

(Author's Last Name, *Name of Publisher*)

Remember that in-text citations need to come at the end of the sentence in which information from one of your sources is used, and it needs to be placed before the period, not after. Here is an example of how to use an in-text citation:

In addition, Canadians were to ship raw materials and supplies to Britain to fuel their war efforts (Vernier, *Collections Canada*).

It is also fine to list an in-text citation for a source that does not list the author's name. If this is the case then you only need to state the name of the publisher:
